Our invitations to give a financial gift to the church can sound like a financial transaction. This approach quickly leads to diminished giving, donor fatigue, and a feeling of scarcity. It does not have to be this way. When a congregation conveys a clear, mission-based reason for giving, it's actually quite easy to invite people to make significant gifts to make that mission possible.

#### A Step Along the Way: Addressing Racism Together.
