#### *Service Projects*

##### **“Better Together” Redwood Falls Food Packing Event**

*This event is a service project held at the SW MN Synod Assembly open to the community and surrounding areas.*

**Leader:** Larry Strenge

**Location:** Field House

**Times:** 7:30-9am Set-up; 9-11am Food Packing Shift; 11am-1pm Food Packing Shift; 1-3pm Food Packing Shift; 3-5pm packing/clean up.

**Description:** A “Better Together” Food Packing event has two missional goals:

Goal #1- Provide opportunities for cross-cultural relationship building

Goal #2- Provide nutritious food for local communities

**What will happen:** Prior to each shift, people from various culture(s) present some educational aspect about their culture (5-10 minutes) and provide orientation for packaging. The participants will package meals of different types that include a nutritional scoop of vitamins. All are designed for American food shelf tastes. All food goes to local food shelves, backpack programs and disable/homeless veterans.

### **Lutheran Social Service Baby Kits**

*Organized by Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota*

**Location: Gymnasium**

**Description:** Bring baby items and assemble baby kits for families with young children in need of support. The “wish list” for the baskets includes:

Diapers (Sizes NB- 5)

Wipes (non-allergenic)

Infant Formula, All Brands

Bottles, Pacifiers & Teethers

Receiving Blankets

Bath Towels

Sippy Cups

Baby Wash, Lotion, and Cotton Swabs

Infant Toys

Diaper Bags

Baby Carriers (new or gently used)

New Baby/Child clothing (NB-5T)

Items should be new. This service project is part of LSS of MN’s Families in Safe Hands (FISH) program, which offers services to families working toward self-sufficiency and stability. The baskets will be distributed to families referred to the FISH program to mark important milestones—a transition to a new home or the birth of a child—and support them in the process.

## ***Workshops***

### **Healing Veterans’ Moral Injuries**

**Leader:** Chaplain Jeff Zust

**Location:** TBD

**Description:** Moral injuries differ from fear-based Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. They are invisible, value-based soul wounds that extend beyond combat into our homes and communities. This workshop will provide a working model to help veterans, families, and congregations understand the formation of moral injuries and pathways for healing.

### **Capital Campaign – Ready or Not?**

**Leader:** Paula Kitt, MIF Director Capital Campaign Services

**Location:** TBD

**Description:** Is your congregation considering a capital campaign? How do you determine if and when you are ready for a fundraising initiative? We will cover some of the key prerequisites for launching a capital campaign as well as ‘red flag’ factors that can negatively affect a campaign. The discussion includes what traits that lead to an effective campaign, and whether to hire a consultant or do it yourself.

### **Music – A Language That Speaks Volumes**

**Leader:** Glocal Music Educators

**Location:** PAC

**Description:** If music has a language of its own, how can we learn it? What is it made of? Is it really universal? In this workshop we sing and share our songs and stories in order to understand what they are telling us, beyond their lyrics, and be able to share their meaning with others. Learn how to sing songs from four different continents of the world. Experiment with playing drums and other percussion, sing in different languages, and explore different styles of music.

### **Natural Death through Comfort Care: Trusting God's Timing**

**Leader:** Rev. Chris Wheatley

**Location:** TBD

**Description:** What is palliative care? What is physician-assisted suicide? How can I preserve my dignity at the end of life? When should I consider discontinuing treatments? What can hospice care provide that my normal medical team does not?

Come and learn about natural death through comfort care, a policy that provides peace, compassion and dignity to you and your loved ones at the end of life. All could benefit from this thought-provoking, conversation-starting presentation.

### **Congregational Memory: A Powerful Tool in Mission Planning**

**Leader:** Paul Daniels, ELCA Region 3 Archivist & Luther Seminary Archivist

**Location:** TBD

**Description:** This talk will focus on how our shared congregational stories can be engaged creatively to help us move forward in mission. Congregational memory is never a neutral force - we can be held back by it, just as easily as we can be instructed and inspired by it. We will look at examples of both in a conversational "back and forth" style session as we look at an under-utilized asset in our churches.

### **The Community of Jesus in a World Where People Hunger**

**Leader:** Rev Daniel Rift

**Location:** TBD

**Description:** We will look together at where the ministry of hunger response rests in the life of the church:

In scripture

In the world

In our congregation.

Participants will network around their best ideas and experiences of ways in which a concern for hunger can extend beyond "stocking the pantry" into other areas of church life and into the world. The concentration will be upon living past the dichotomies that are often expressed in this work (for example: between charity and justice; between worship and service; between doing and being, between "the poor will always be with you" and "we can end hunger in our life time").

**Public Mission: Social Action and Advocacy**

**Leader:** Glocal Music Educators

**Description:** Equip yourself with resources to effectively mobilize your congregation to act through service, giving, advocacy, and lifestyle choices. Learn about the root causes of hunger and poverty. Learn about advocacy as a tool for helping our neighbor. This workshop surveys practical approaches to social justice, and is geared toward people with beginning to moderate experience in justice work.

**Description:** Hunger exists in SW Minnesota. Come hear from a panel of speakers on how their organizations help meet the needs of their communities.

**The Women and Justice Social Statement: Your Voice in the Process**

**Description:** The Draft of a Social Statement on Women and Justice is available for your review. All ELCA Social Statements are considered a work of the church (meaning you) therefore, your voice and comments are important and need to be heard. Come learn about the Social Statement process and how you can be a part of the vetting process of this document before it goes to the ELCA Church Council and Church-wide Assembly for adoption.
